FORMATTING GUIDELINES FOR BOOK REVIEWS AND NOTICES

The first page of text in a book review or notice should begin with full citation information for the book, including the book's title, the names of all the author(s) or editor(s), parenthetical information about a series (if any), the place of publication, publisher, date, ISBN, and pagination. This is followed by the name of the reviewer. This information should be in the following format:
